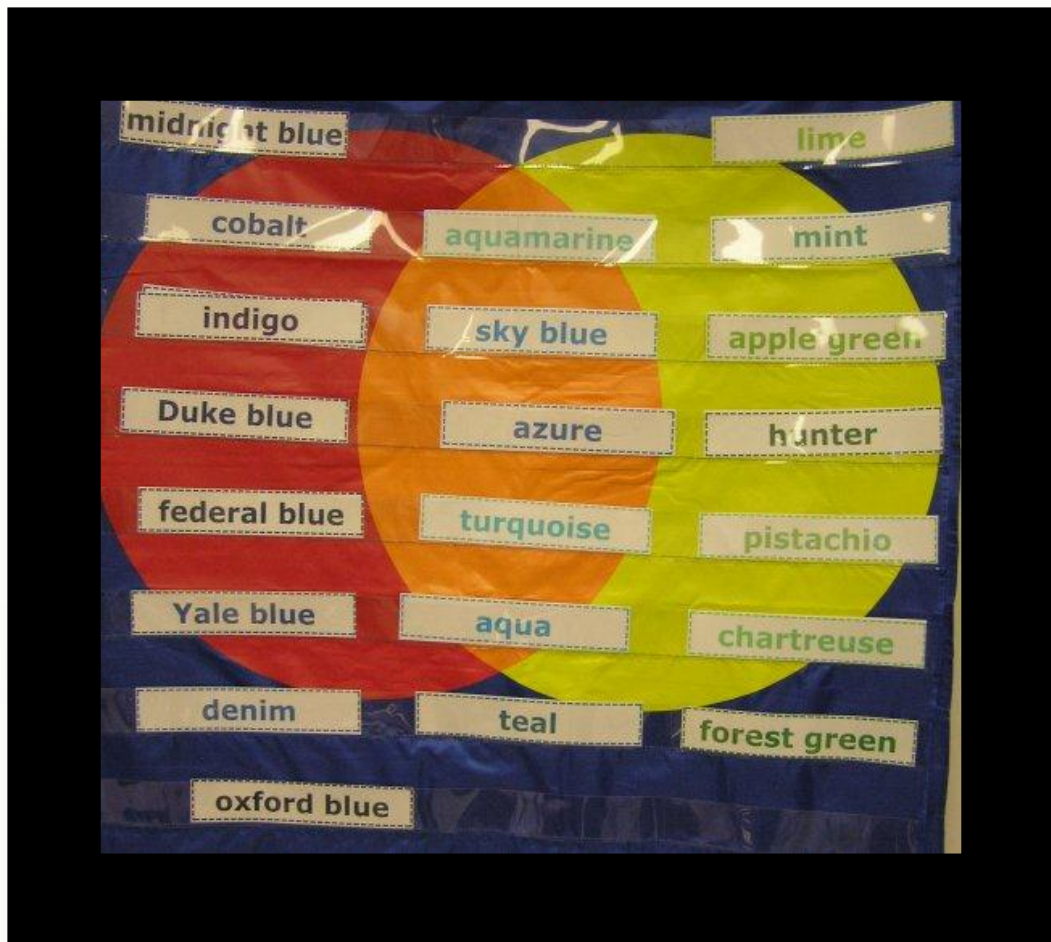



Do your students know the difference between **fuchsia** and **chartreuse**? Here are some ways to have a little fun with this colorful word wall.

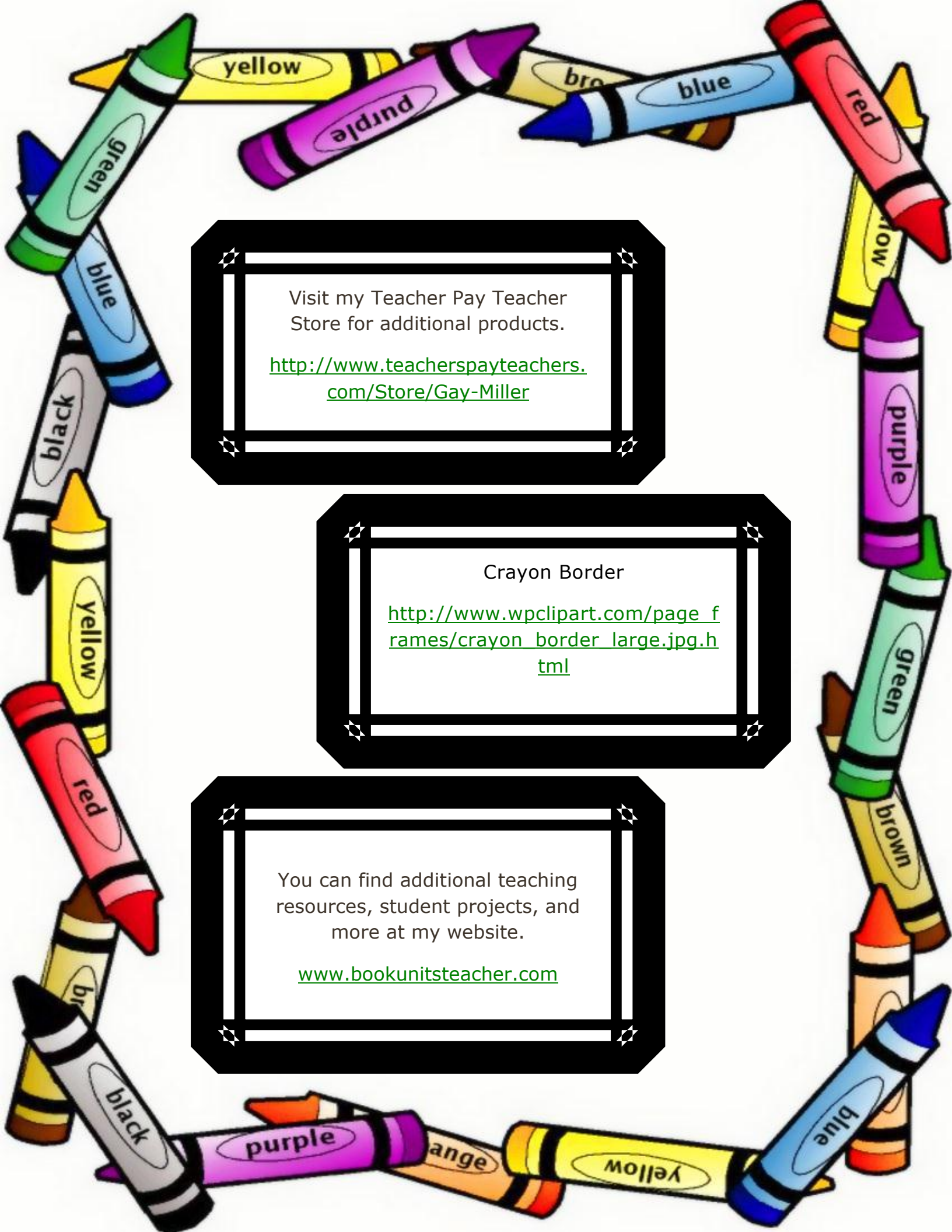
