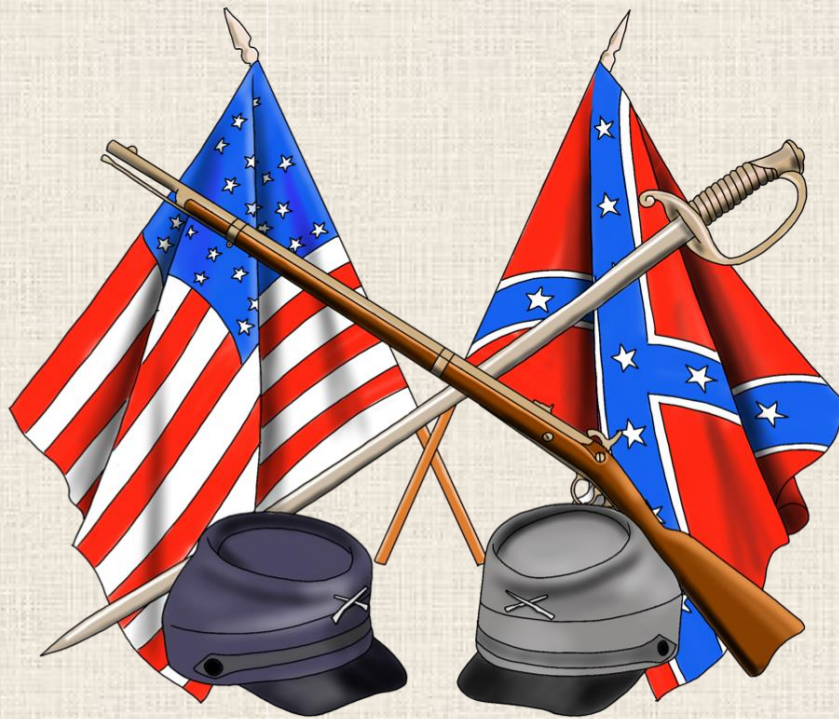

Ten Interesting Facts... The American Civil War

1. In August 1863, while Abraham Lincoln was heading home from the White House someone took a shot at him. The bullet went through his hat. Lincoln asked the guards to keep the incident quiet because he did not want to worry his wife.
2. The first confrontation of the Civil War took place on April 12, 1861 when Confederate troops attacked Fort Sumter beginning the war. The war ended on April 9, 1865 when Lee surrendered to Grant at Appomattox Court House. The beginning and ending dates were used in creating the title of the Civil War novel *Across Five Aprils*.
3. Approximately 750,000 men died in the Civil War. This is more than any other American War.

4. The Union Army had 2,100,000 soldiers. This was almost twice the size of the Confederate Army of 1,064,000.
5. More men died from disease than in the actual fighting.

10. Measles	6,000	5,2000

6. Of the 9 million people living in the Southern States, 3.4 million were slaves. Two states actually had more slaves than free people: Mississippi and South Carolina. These slaves were worth more than 2 billion dollars.
7. During the first few battles of the Civil War, soldiers did not have regular uniforms. This made knowing who was the enemy difficult.
8. The bloodiest day in U.S. military history took place at Antietam on September 17, 1862 when more than 5,000 soldiers died.

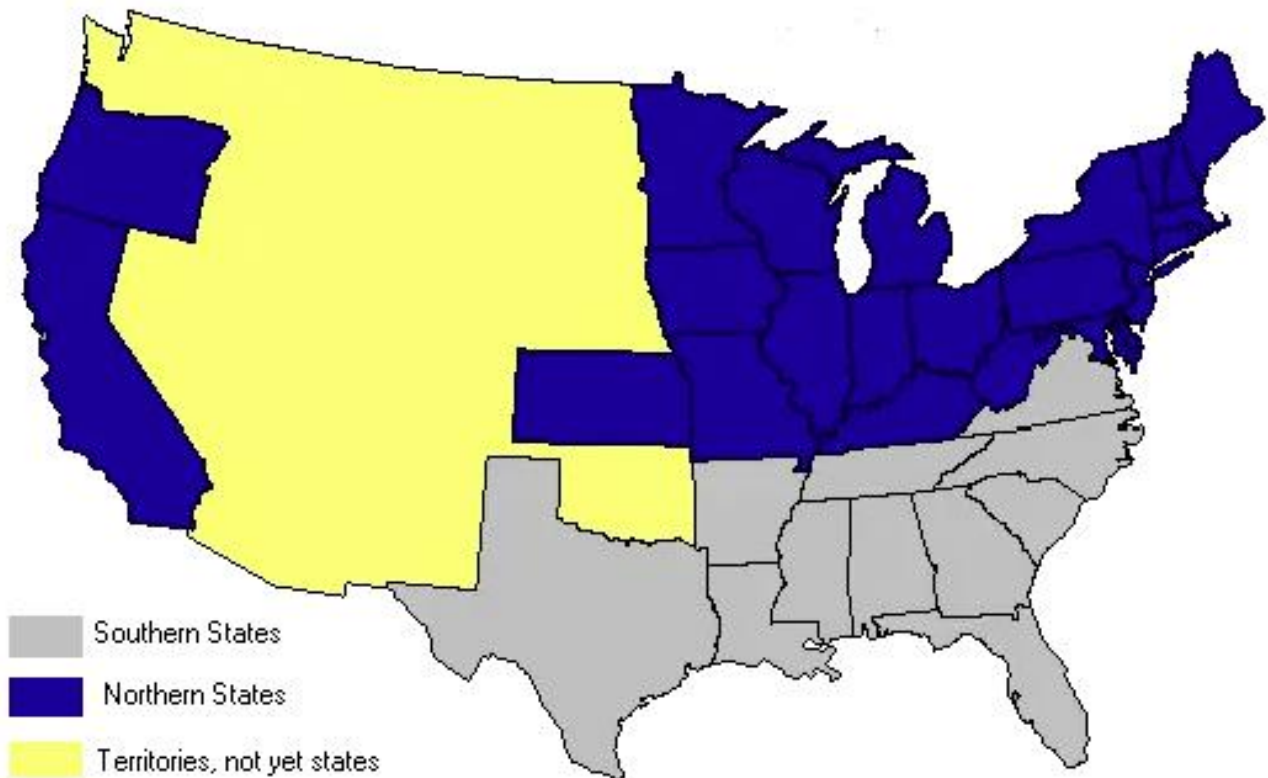

Lee's surrender to Grant at Appomattox Court House, April 9, 1865, effectively ended the war.

November 6 — Lincoln elected president of the U.S.

December 20 — South Carolina secedes from the Union

1861

February 22 — Jefferson Davis inaugurated as President of the Confederacy

March 4 — Lincoln inaugurated President of the United States

April 12 — Confederate troops attack Fort Sumter, beginning the Civil War

April 15 — President Lincoln calls for army volunteers

May 21 — Richmond, Virginia, chosen as the Confederate capital

July 21 — Confederate troops defeat Union troops at the First Battle of Bull Run (Manassas)

1862

March 9 — First battle between ironclad ships (USS Monitor vs. CSS Virginia)

April 6-7 — Battle of Shiloh

August 29-30 — Second Battle of Bull Run (Manassas)

September 17 — Battle of Antietam (Sharpsburg, Maryland)

September 22 — Lincoln issues the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation

December 13 — Battle of Fredericksburg

1863

January 1 — The Emancipation Proclamation formally takes effect

May 1-4 — Battle of Chancellorsville (Gen. Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson is wounded by his own troops; he dies of complications on May 10)

May 18 – July 4 — Siege of Vicksburg; the July 4 surrender gives the North control of the Mississippi River

July 1-3 — Battle of Gettysburg

September 19-20 — Battle of Chickamauga

November 19 — Gettysburg Address

December 31 – January 3 — Battle of Stones River (Murfreesboro)

1864

March 9 — Grant appointed Commander-in-Chief of Union armies

May 5-7 — Battle of the Wilderness

May 8-19 — Battle of Spotsylvania

November 8 — Lincoln re-elected President

November 15 — Sherman begins his March to the Sea through Georgia

1865

April 9 — Lee surrenders to Grant at Appomattox Court House

April 14 — Lincoln is assassinated

April 26 — John Wilkes Booth shot and killed

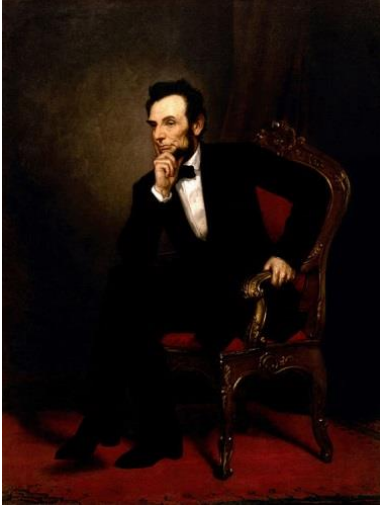
May 26 — Last Confederate troops surrender

July 7 — Four Lincoln assassination conspirators hanged

December 6 — Thirteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution ratified

American Civil War Timeline

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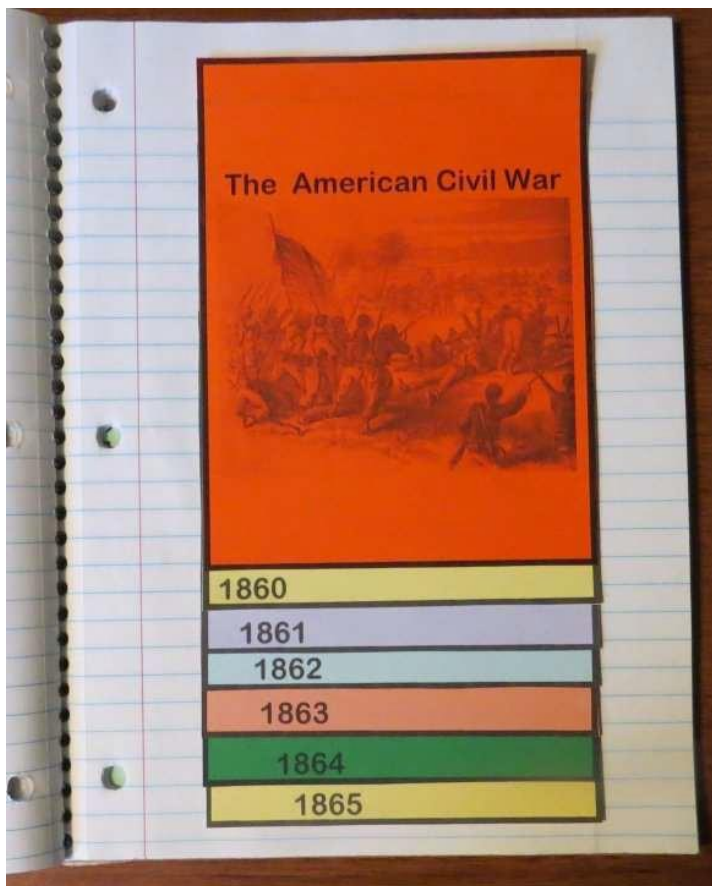
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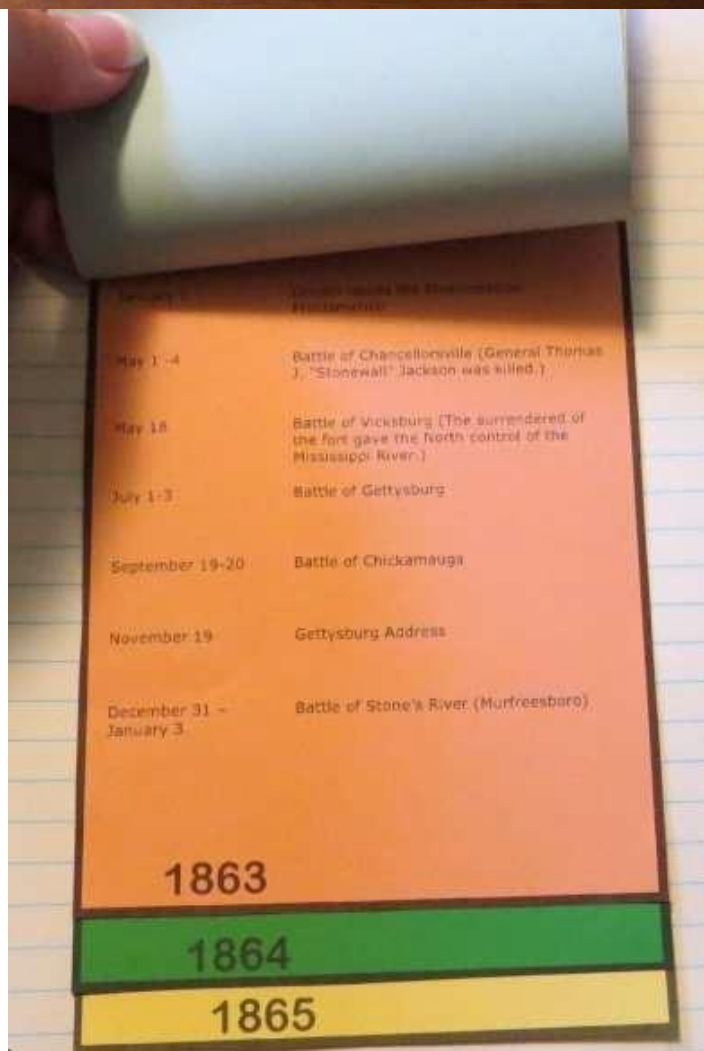
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Civil War Timeline ~ Staggered Flip



Instructions for Completing the Organizer

1. Print the organizer onto colored paper. Two versions are offered. The first has lines for students to write their own information. The second is an answer key with the text completed.
2. Cut out rectangles.
3. Begin with the bottom page in the stack. Turn the page on its back and place a thin line of glue across the top of the page only. Glue it toward the bottom of the organizer notebook or lap book.
4. On the back of the next page, place a thin line of glue along the top.
5. Glue this page directly onto the organizer page moving it up approximately one-half of an inch higher than the first page.
6. Continue to add pages until all are glued down.
7. The pages should lift up so that students can read the information.
