Craftivity Instructions

Step 1 ~ Give each student one closed grocery bag. Students are to cut one inch strips from the opened end of the bag to approximately half way down the bag. Note: These do not need to





Step 2 ~ Open the bag. Hold the bottom against a table with one hand. With the other hand twist the middle portion of the bag to form the trunk of the tree.



Step 3 ~ Hold approximately every two strips together and twist beginning at the trunk end out to the ends to form branches.





Step 5~ Have students write a vocabulary word, definition, or a short sentence on each apple.



Step 6 ~ Cut out the apple and leaf shapes.

Step 9 ~ Hang the apples on the tree. Glue the leaves onto the branches.


Step 7 ~ You can hang the finished apples with paper clips, bread ties, or yarn. On the back of one apple in each set, tape a hanger making sure sticks up high enough to tie/hang onto the finished tree.




Step 8 ~ Glue the three apple pieces back-to-back.
