

Verb

A verb is a part of speech that shows the occurrence or performance of an action, the existence of a state or condition, etc.

Verb tenses show when the action happens (time). Past, present, and future are the three basic verb tenses in the English language.

Use a variation of these sentences to complete the examples:

I (to study) the lesson.
I (to write) in my diary each day.

The English language contains many verbs that do not follow the pattern. These are called irregular verbs. Irregular verbs do not form the past tense by adding – ed. These verbs must be memorized. The verb to write is one of these irregular verbs.

Present Tense

Present (verb + s)

action is taking place now, action takes place repeatedly, the speaker believes a fact to be true (never includes a helping verb)

Examples

Present Perfect

(has/have + past participle)
unnamed time before now
Examples

Present Progressive (am/is/are and verb ending with -ing)

is going to happen at the same time the sentence is written

Examples

Past Tense

Past Tense (verb + ed)

action takes place in the past (never includes a helping verb), may be a series of completed actions **Examples**

| Past Perfect | (had + past participle)

something occurred before another action in the past (includes had)

Examples

Past Progressive (was/were and verb ending with –ing)

was happening when another action occurred **Examples**

Future Tense

Future (will/shall or going to + verb)

action is going to take place **Examples**

Future Perfect (have / has + past participle)

something will occur before another action in the future (includes will have and going to have)

Examples

Future Progressive (will be or shall be and verb ending with –ing)

an ongoing or continuous action that will take place in the future



Present Perfect (has/have + past participle) unnamed time before now Examples

I have studied the lesson. I have written in my diary for years.

Present Progressive (am/is/are and verb ending with -ing)

is going to happen at the same time the sentence is written

Examples

I am studying the lesson. I am writing in my diary every night.

Past Tense

Past Tense (verb + ed) action takes place in the past (never includes a

helping verb), may be a series of completed actions

Examples

I studied the lesson.
I wrote in my diary every day last week.

Past Perfect (had + past participle)

something occurred before another action in the past (includes had)

Examples

I had studied the lesson.
I had written in the diary for 3 months before completely filling up the pages.

Past Progressive (was/were and verb ending with –ing)

was happening when another action occurred **Examples**

I was studying the lesson when the phone rang.
I was writing in my diary when I had to stop and help cook supper.

Future Tense

Future (will/shall or going to + verb)

action is going to take place **Examples**

I will study the lesson.

I will write in my diary later today.

Future Perfect

(have / has + past participle) something will occur before another action in the future (includes will have and going to have)

Examples

I will have studied the lesson for hours before the test. I will have written hundreds of pages by the time I am 15 years old.

Future Progressive (will be or shall be and verb ending with –ing)


an ongoing or continuous action that will take place in the future

Examples

I will be studying every night this week.

I will be writing when you arrive.
