- * Printable Even if you don't plan to use the foldable organizers, you will need to keep them handy as this is where you will find the answer keys.

You will find answer keys by looking at the printable resource. For many of the lapbook organizers, I created multiple versions. The final version is the answer key.

All of the photos in this resource are either in public domain or taken by me. Because I used public domain images or photos taken by me, I placed them on top of the slides. This means they can be resized and/or changed to different photos.

Images (mostly clipart) that are copyrighted have been embedded into the backgrounds and can't be moved.

Because the text is in textboxes or tables on the slides, it is editable. You can adapt it to meet the needs of your students. This also means that students can highlight the articles.

Information about the Videos

Advancements in technology amaze me! Just a year or two ago, the articles in Google Docs would have had a list of links that take you to suggested videos on the web. With advancements, these same links will actually allow you to view the videos as if you had downloaded them to your computer; however, **the videos are still just suggested links**. Because of technology, you can now view the videos directly through Google Docs without going back and forth to Youtube.

What This Means for You

- You can delete the videos by clicking on them and hitting the delete key on your keyboard. You are basically just deleting a link.
- Do you have some favorite videos you like to show? Because Google is the parent company for Youtube, you can live stream Youtube videos in Google Docs and Slides. Non-Youtube videos can also be added to your Google files if you place the videos in your Google Drive.
- The videos are streaming live from Youtube.
 - I don't have the means to test this, but my guess is they will be blocked if your school district has a block on viewing Youtube. Test this before class if you plan to use one of the videos at school.
 - If someone removes his/her video from the web, it will most likely be a broken link in Docs.
 Again, I can only test this with time. For legal reasons, I cannot download other people's videos
 and place them in my materials to prevent this from happening. If you find a broken link, please
 send me an email at teachwithgaymiller@gmail.com, so I can remove the link from the Google
 Doc and find suitable replacements.



Google Digital Resources

Instructions for Google Users

Getting Started

- 1. Get a free Google account.
- 2. Each student will also need a free Google account.

Opening and Saving

- 1. Use this links from PAGE 2 of this resource to download your digital interactive resource.
- 2. When you click on the link, you will be prompted to "Make a Copy." Click on this button.
- 3. A copy will open in your Google Slides. Before you assign this page to your students, it is **very important** to first save a copy of the file on your own Google Drive. You can then edit the copy. This will keep your original intact.

Sharing with Your Students

Google Classroom

- 1. Save the notebook to your Google Drive.
- 2. Go to your Google Classroom Account.
- 3. Create a new assignment o announcement.
- 4. You can attach the notebook directly from your Drive.

Shared link

- 1. Save the notebook to your Google Drive.
- 2. Click share.
- 3. Click "Get shareable link."
- 4. Give students the link. [Note: You may not post this link in any public location such as a teacher website.]

E-mail

- 1. Save the notebook to your Google Drive.
- 2. Click share.
- 3. Enter the students e-mail addresses.

Student Instructions

- 1. Have students click on the link you provide.
- 2. If a pop-up appears, tell student to click on "Make a Copy."
- 3. If no "Make a Copy" option appears, have student click File ⇒ Make a Copy ⇒Ok.
- 4. All the slides are 8.5 by 11. They have text boxes for the students to add their own text. Students may also add their own text boxes if needed.

Instructions for Microsoft OneDrive Users

Getting Started

1. Get a free Google account.

Opening and Saving

- 1. Use this links from PAGE 2 of this resource to download your digital interactive resource.
- 2. Go to the menu. Click File⇒ Download as ⇒ Microsoft PowerPoint (.pptx)
 - Save to your computer.
- 3. Open your OneDrive.
 - For better organization, create a folder for this digital resource.
 - Open the empty folder. Drag and drop the file you have saved into this folder.

Your digital resource is now ready to share with your students.

Sharing with Your Students

- 1. Students need to work in the "edit mode."
- 2. When asked to choose to edit the file in PowerPoint or online, select online.
- 3. Follow the normal steps in sharing the file with your students.
 - Go to Share

 Share with people

 Choose View Only
 - Require students to make a copy on their own drive before edition the file.
