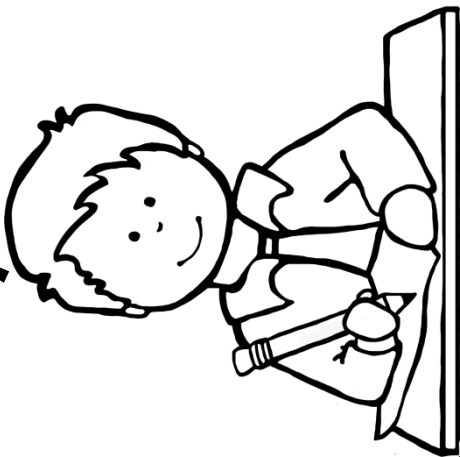

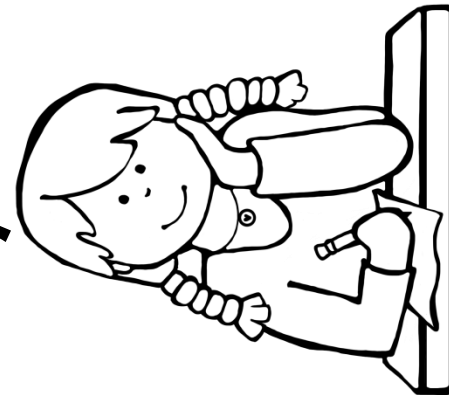


Begin with dialogue. Use quotations either between two characters or have the narrator talk directly to the reader.

Begin by asking a question to get the reader thinking.


Begin with a vivid description. Be sure to use specific details that paint a picture.

Begin with an interesting fact. This can be a shocking statement.

Begin with a sound that is associated with the action that is taking place in the first scene of the story.

11 Lessons with Activities

SUSPECT: Jamie Thompson

- Role:** Soccer Team Captain
- Alibi:** Jamie says they were practicing with the soccer team in the gym until 6:30 PM. After practice, they claim they stayed to clean up equipment.
- Motive:** Jamie has mentioned being frustrated that the soccer team didn't receive a trophy like the academic team did. They've expressed that the Golden Falcon should belong to a team that "actually plays hard."
- Suspicious Details:** Jamie wears size 8 cleats, which matches the muddy footprint found near the trophy case. No one saw Jamie change out of their cleats after practice.



SUSPECT: Ms. Lee

- Role:** Science Teacher
- Alibi:** Ms. Lee was grading papers in her classroom down the hall from the trophy case. She says she left the school at 7:00 PM.
- Motive:** Ms. Lee has joked in the past that the trophy case would be a great spot for science fair displays. She's been advocating for more recognition of student scientists at the school.
- Suspicious Details:** A sticky note with the phrase "Needs more space" was found in the trophy case, but Ms. Lee's shoes and classroom floor were spotless with no mud.



SUSPECT: Alex Garcia

- Role:** School Reporter
- Alibi:** Alex says they were taking yearbook photos around the school until 6:45 PM, then left to interview someone at the local coffee shop.
- Motive:** Alex has been critical of the academic decathlon team in the past, writing an article accusing them of being "bad team players." Some students think Alex might have taken the trophy to make a statement.
- Suspicious Details:** Alex's camera bag was found left near the library, close to the trophy case. They also seemed nervous when questioned.

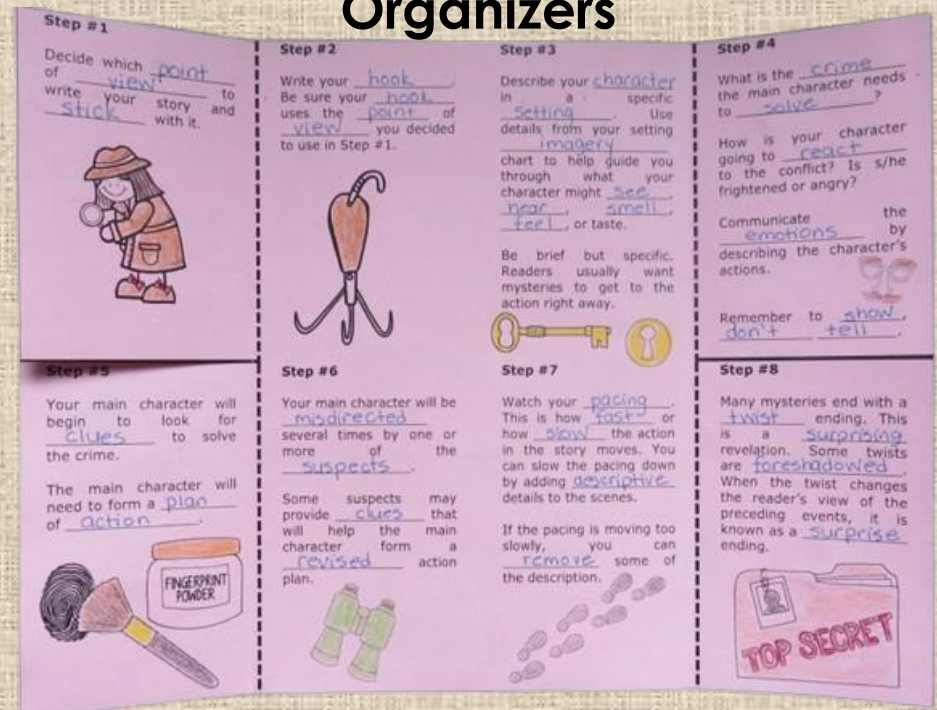


SUSPECT: Mia Lopez

- Role:** Art Club President
- Alibi:** Mia was painting in the art room until 6:50 PM. She says she left early to help her younger sibling with homework.
