

Links to Prefix Activities




This post brings together various teaching resources and ideas I've developed over time to teach prefixes. While different programs were used to create these activities, making it challenging to compile them into a single handout, I've included as many activities as possible. For those that couldn't be included, I've provided links. This handout offers a mix of resources to help teach prefixes, including:

- links to resources, product samples, and free printables
- teaching ideas that don't require printables
- printable games

All the resources are free, except for the advertising on the final page.





This idea doesn't have a link. I've included the instruction here for a quick reference.

- 1. First, cut the paper into approximately 1 by 5-inch strips.
- Next, cut an additional piece of paper 1 by 7 inches long.
- 3. Stack the pages together with the 7-inch piece on the bottom.
- 4. Line all the pages evenly at one end and staple them together to form a book with turning pages.
- 5. Finally, students write the prefix on the 7-inch piece of paper. On each page of the stack, they write an additional word (base word) that can be used with the prefix.
- The book flips where each word can be read and discussed. Our books contained 8 pages; however, you can make them with more or fewer pages.

One way to greatly expand your student's vocabulary is to teach prefixes and suffixes. When I first created this webpage, it had 19 links to online prefix games. Over time several companies have remove their free online games. The page currently has four games. You can see them here: free online games.












Here is another teaching idea without a link.

- Using large flip chart paper, draw three to four vertical lines to form columns.
- 2. Next, label each column with one prefix.
- 3. On sticky notes, write base or root words that form real words when added to **one** of the prefixes listed on top of the anchor chart. Note: When completing this activity for the first time, using base words that only form one real word works best. For example, **turn** only forms a real word when the prefix **re-** is added. Nonturn, unturn, and disturn are not real words.
- Students place the sticky notes onto the anchor chart in the column that forms a real word.
- 5. Complete this activity in small groups, as part of a learning center, or as an early finisher project.

The foldable prefix organizer is a hands-on, interactive tool that helps students break down and understand the components of words, particularly focusing on prefixes. This foldable handout is divided into multiple sections that guide students through analyzing word structure, giving them the opportunity to identify and learn the meanings of various prefixes, suffixes, and root words.

Answer Key for Prefix and Suffix Organizer

How the Organizer Works:

The organizer includes six columns labeled with key elements: **meaning**, **root word**, **prefix**, **suffix**, **picture**, and **word**. Students will complete this chart by identifying and filling in each section based on given or researched words.

Meaning: In the first column, students write the definition of the word, focusing on how the prefix affects its meaning. For example, "the condition of not being happy" for the word *unhappiness*.

Root Word: Students identify the root or base word in the next column, which is the word without any prefixes or suffixes. For *unhappiness*, the root word would be *happy*.

Prefix: In this column, students write the prefix that modifies the meaning of the root word. Using the example above, they would write un- in the prefix column for unhappiness.

Suffix: If applicable, students include the suffix in the suffix column. For words like *unhappiness* or *nonflexible*, they would fill in *-ness* or *-ible*.

Picture: To make the learning experience more visual, students can draw a small picture or symbol that represents the word's meaning. This helps reinforce vocabulary through visual association, for example, a sad face to represent unhappiness.

Word: In the final column, students combine the prefix, root word, and suffix (if applicable) to write the complete word, such as *previewed* or *nonedible*.

Example of a Completed Organizer:

Meaning: "The condition of not being happy"

Root Word: happy


Prefix: un-

Suffix: -ness

Picture: A sad face

Word: unhappiness

This activity helps students visually dissect and analyze words, reinforcing their understanding of how prefixes and suffixes modify meaning. Additionally, students get practice applying their knowledge by completing the foldable organizer and learning to use new vocabulary in context. This organizer is versatile and can be used for individual study, group work, or as a classroom center activity.


