

Root Word Activities






All the resources are free, except for the advertising on the final page.













Try making a 3-D root word tree.

Turn those 3-D root word trees spooky for Halloween. This is a great activity to pair with *The Ghost-Eye Tree*.



Change up this idea by using vocabulary words. This is a fun project to use with Steven Kellogg's Johnny Appleseed.

Craftivity Instructions

Step 1 \sim Give each student one closed grocery bag. Students are to cut one inch strips from the opened end of the bag to approximately half way down the bag. Note: These do not need to be exact.

Step 2 \sim Open the bag. Hold the bottom against a table with one hand. With the other hand twist the middle portion of the bag to form the trunk of the tree.







Step $3 \sim$ Hold approximately every two strips together and twist beginning at the trunk end out to the ends to form branches.

Step 4 ~ Print the next two pages onto heavyweight paper. Construction paper works well.



Step 5~ Have students write a vocabulary word, definition, or a short sentence on each apple.

Step 9 ~ Hang the apples on the tree. Glue the

leaves onto the branches.





Step 6 ~ Cut out the apple and leaf shapes.


Step 7 ~ You can hang the finished apples with paper clips, bread ties, or yarn. On the back of one apple in each set, tape a hanger making sure sticks up high enough to tie/hang onto the finished tree.

Step 8 ~ Glue the three apple pieces back-to-back.













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


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Directions for Making Spoons Activities

- Option #1 (Class Sets)
 - * Print the playing cards onto heavy weight paper or cardstock.
 - **x** Ignore the lines on the cards.
 - **×** Laminate for repeated use.
 - **X** Cut cards apart.
 - **×** Storage pockets are provided.
- Option #2 (Individual Student Sets)
 - * Print the playing cards onto heavy weight paper or cardstock.
 - * Lines are provided on the cards for students to write definitions or sentences with the words.
 - X Cut cards apart.
 - **x** Storage pockets are provided.

The cards contain the following roots:

- Root ~ voc/vok
- ❖ Root ~ vid/vis
- ❖ Root ~ spec
- Root ~ port
- The cards may be used as a simple matching exercise or for a variety of game activities.
- ❖ An instruction for using the cards to play Spoons follows the printable pockets.

Storage Pockets



Print the storage pockets on colored paper.

Have students cut out the pocket on the bold lines.




To make the pocket, fold the left and right sides toward the back of the pocket on the dotted lines.


Next fold the bottom flap up toward the back.


Glue the flaps in place.


Glue the pocket to a file folder as pictured below or inside an interactive notebook.

































Root Words Organizer ~ Hexagon Fold

Instructions

- Print organizer onto colored paper.
- Have students cut the organizer out on the lines indicated.
- o After filling in the missing information, students will fold each hexagon in half.
- Students may label the outside of each flap with the word and its definition.
- o Students will write a sentence with the word on the inside of each hexagon.





She placed a bar of iron in the middle of the kitchen floor, and then by her magic arts made the iron **invisible** to human eyes.


"I am now going away to make a **visit**. While I am gone the Scarecrow will rule over you. I command you to obey him as you would me."

Chapter $10 \sim \text{Because}$ if you did not wear **spectacles** the brightness and glory of the Emerald City would blind you.


Chapter $18 \sim$ The Scarecrow sat in the big throne and the others stood **respectfully** before him.

Chapter 10 ~ In the center of the chair was an enormous Head, without a body to **support** it or any arms or legs whatever.



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



